Course Requirements:

- 1. Attendance. Attendance and participation are essential to your progress. You will be allowed a maximum of <u>2 absences</u> during the semester without penalty. - **2. Daily preparation of assigned lessons.** The tutor will be evaluating your daily performance. You are welcome to ask her how you are doing:

 - 3 points: Well-prepared and good performance

- **3. Homework.** Even though the tutor may not assign any particular exercises for homework, students should complete exercises associated with the lesson being studied.
- 4. Quiz (e.g. dictation, vocabulary, grammar, oral, etc.) is given on every Thursday at the start of class, followed by regular class session. There are no make-ups. Your lowest quiz score (including zero due to an absence) will be disregarded at the end of semester in order to give you a cushion against a planned/unplanned absence.
- 5. Midterm and Final Exam. In addition to <u>written final</u>, there is also an individual <u>oral final</u> exam which is administered by the examiner. If an extraordinary circumstance (work related, medical or other emergencies) prevents you from taking midterm or final exam, contact the <u>director within three days</u> to set up a make-up date. You will be penalized (reduction of scores) if you fail to provide a document.
- **6. Incompletes** are given only when students miss the Final Exam in cases of documented emergencies and can only be given to students who are passing the course. MFLL department requires that a form be filled out and signed by both the student and instructor.
